Gathering a selection of various works (film, performance, texts...) and scenographic objects collected on-site or in the surroundings of the Foundation, the exhibition elaborates on the variation, alteration, permutation and comparison between the status of various spaces, whether indoor or outdoor, private or public, scenic or demonstrative.

Based on the understanding of the wide range of activities and interactions that structure and sequence the site of the Foundation – home to an art center, a nursing home, artists' studios, and a park – the reflection carried out during the residency is synthetized through three specific temporalities: organic time, historic time and narrative time. In opposition to the horizontal, cyclical and repetitive tempo that characterizes heavenly bodies, choreography and theater plays, here, les gens d'Uterpan have imagined a vertical earthly time. A grounded time that propels us upwards, toward the experiential and experimental.

Through questioning the various spaces and rhythms of the site of Nogent, les gens d'Uterpan highlight conscious and unconscious behaviors and the adjustment of active and passive positions induced by the work. Panic at the dance hall tackles the question of mobility and action, of the artifact and the gesture to be performed or avoided to raise awareness about the part the audience takes in the game of art and the elaboration of its message.

This exhibition is the culmination of a standardization process of dance and movement carried out in the museum and exhibitions – a process initiated by les gens d'Uterpan in 2003 with *Home Clubbing* and in 2005 with the *X-Event 2* protocols.

Panic at the dance hall aims at making the audience aware of the role it plays in the exhibition and the art setting at large today. This "involvement" of the audience is taking place in a context of increased interchangeability of the functions of author, curator, producer and artist. The exhibition is then becoming the place of "thinking-and-seeing-as-a-all", playing on now constant and conscious shifts, choreographic issues, and permutations.

The work of les gens d'Uterpan questions the norms and conventions that govern exhibitions and the live arts. Relying on the mechanisms of adjustment of the individual, the body, and creation to these contexts, the artists create a critical work based on the choreographers' initial practice.
