

From January 12 to March 26, 2023, the MABA is happy to present a new chapter of the *Paris Peinture* project, launched by the artists Karina Bisch and Nicolas Chardon in 2018 along with a book of portraits published by CONNOISSEURS, their publishing house dedicated to contemporary painting.

Following the exhibitions at Le Quadrilatère, Beauvais, in 2018 and at the Jean Brolly gallery, Paris, in 2020, *Paris Peinture* — *Ici et Maintenant* presents «the first and last painting» of fourteen artists living or having lived in Paris.

An original essay by author and performer Thomas Clerc develops a narrative around this adventure and body of thirty or so works presented at the art center, accompanied by a graphic intervention by Olivier Lebrun.

Paris Peinture tells stories of painting(s) strangely happening after the end of the story and after the death of painting. For this new chapter, Paris Peinture – Ici et Maintenant questions the nature of these stories. Are they fictions, fables or legends? The works of the exhibition set a temporal framework (first and last paintings of each artist), which, instead of constraining and limiting the collective space, fragments and opens it up, revealing the fruitful tension between life and form, lives and forms. Each artist paints his or her story. The pictorial time brings depth to the world. Individual stories are broader than collective history. These combined stories create multifaceted spaces that thwart the linearity of chronological time.

Modernism was obsessed with ideas of origin and end. It worshipped its pioneers and was haunted by the last painting. This new proposal by Karina Bisch and Nicolas Chardon tries to tell a story cleared of these myths, and thinks about contemporary painting in the imperfect tense of the present.
